Duties:

The appointee will also be expected to: teach courses in English, supervise graduate students' thesis, attend faculty meetings, and serve on faculty and university committees as appropriate.

Required Qualifications:

- 1. A terminal degree of PhD or DMA in Composition or Music-and-Technologyrelated diploma;
- 2. Strong competence in electronic and computer music composition, as well as interdisciplinary artwork;
- 3. A strong profile as a composer and artist whose practices engage creatively with up-to-date technology and the software-hardware integration.

Preferred Qualifications:

- 1. Teaching experience in computer music, electronic music, technology-related or interdisciplinary art creation;
- 2. Experiences of cross-nation collaboration;
- 3. International competition award recipients.

- 5. An official copy of the teaching certificate issued by the Ministry of Education (R.O.C.) (optional)
- 6. Course curricula and syllabi, statement of teaching experience, or original copies of research projects.
- 7. Portfolio of creative activities in digital form, which includes documentation of a minimum of 3 pieces with music-and-technology interdisciplinary approaches (dates valid between April 11, 2019 and April 10, 2024). Recordings are to be included.
- 8. Applicants with international prizes/awards are required to submit up to 5 works in the choices of instrumentation-orchestra, chamber, vocal or other interdisciplinary forms. The total duration of works submitted is not less than the following requirements:

For professor: 90 minutes For associate professor: 80 minutes For assistant professor: 70 minutes For lecturer: 60 minutes.

The submission should include scores, proof of public performance, and audio/video recordings.

9. For applicants with doctoral degrees received within 2 years and without any previous full-time teaching position at higher education institutions, a copy of the doctoral dissertation or degree recital/performance in video format is required for submission.
